Extension Fee Assistance for Homes and Farms

Overview

We provide limited financial assistance toward the cost of connecting homes or farm irrigation service to our electrical distribution system where infrastructure does not currently exist.

The Uneconomic Extension (UEA) fund – which draws from a maximum annual budget – covers new overhead electric service extensions that require a transformer and more than one span of line along a maintained road with public access. Through an application process, funding is allocated on a lowest–cost–per–customer basis, and funding preference will be given to areas where future facilities may be required to support economic development in B.C.

Who is eligible

Through the UEA fund, we provide financial assistance toward construction costs of a single-phase overhead electric service for a principal residence, a principal residence on a productive farm¹, farm irrigation or for a three-phase overhead service for farm irrigation.

Funding only applies to the portion of the line built along a public, maintained road where infrastructure (power lines, poles and transformers) does not currently exist. With the exception of farm irrigation, funding is restricted to one allowance per parcel of land.

The building should be substantially complete and ready for connection. Once your project receives UEA funding, you won't be eligible for any additional or future refunds.

Funding breakdown

We'll cover a portion of the full extension cost, based on eligibility criteria. You will be responsible for all additional costs.

PRINCIPAL RESIDENCE

O Funding covers 90 percent of the cost up to 800 meters beyond the first span of line for a single-phase extension.

PRINCIPAL RESIDENCE ON A FARM¹

• Funding covers 90 percent of the cost up to 1,200 meters beyond the first span of line for a single-phase extension.

FARM IRRIGATION

• Funding covers costs of a single or three-phase extension – equivalent to the estimated annual revenue of electric service for farm irrigation over six years.

You live in a principal residence and want to connect to BC Hydro to receive a 200 amp electric service. The nearest line is 1.2 km away and an extension must be built along the road to the property. If you qualify for funding, here is the breakdown of costs to you:

\$ 51,838	Your cost
838:	Service connection fee
32,500:	Full cost of the remaining 325 metres of line and poles
8,000:	10% of the cost of the next 800 metres of line and poles
3,000:	Full cost of one transformer
\$ 7,500:	Full cost for the first span of line (approx. 75 metres) and one pole

Exclusions

UEA funding is not available for subdivisions, recreational and seasonal properties, extensions on private property or along unmaintained roads, underground or submarine cables, right-of-way clearing on private property, and commercial enterprises.
